WEEKLY REFLECTION

Pentecost 18C, 2022, Lk 17. 11-19

Cast Out by the Outcasts

Jesus encounters the ten lepers between Samaria and Galilee. Luke often uses geography to point to a spiritual landscape and this is a particularly apt example. Jesus meets ten marginal people in a marginal space. The broader geography is that Jesus has "set his face" to Jerusalem, the center of meaning and power, where he will be crucified.

But some outcasts are cast out more than

others. One of the lepers was a Samaritan who would presumably be marginalized by his marginal companions. Sort of a double whammy. In this marginal place, Jesus tells the lepers to go to the center of power, to the very people who have declared them unclean, for validation that they are clean. I can't help but suspect that Jesus was being sarcastic, grumbling at the lepers to find out how they really want to be "healed." When they suddenly find themselves clean, only the marginalized Samaritan returns to Jesus, who is still standing in the marginal space. That the other nine would go straight to the priests, at the center of power, is the strongest indication of how the Samaritan was treated by them. The Samaritan was healed, not only of leprosy, but of the social and religious system that required that some people be declared unclean so that others can be "clean." This is the healing that the other nine former-lepers miss out on.

Jesus and marginality come up so many times in the Gospels, ... we need to wake up and really listen. Surely the Gospels hammer this theme so many times because we need to be healed of being hard of hearing. This story prompts us to reflect on what we do when we find ourselves in marginal positions, having been cast out and declared unclean in some way. Do we band together with other outcasts in a constructive way? Or do we band together in resentment at the establishment? Does our little outcast group amount to a mini-establishment with people divided between clean and unclean? Do we run back to the establishment that exiled us if we get a chance to do so?

That only the Samaritan returned to Jesus to thank him raises the question of what causes gratitude and what hinders it. I suggest that a system that divides people between clean and unclean inhibits gratitude. When we live with this kind of mindset, we inevitably feel entitled to our advantages and delude ourselves into thinking we have earned them. We also inevitably feel that lepers have "earned" their marginalization. If returning to the center of power is what we want, then gratitude is the last thing we feel if we manage to do just that. Of course, the Samaritan had to advantage of not having the same option of going to a priest to be declared clean as his fellow lepers did. Being cleansed wasn't enough to take him out of the margins. Remaining in the margins gave him the opportunity to give Jesus another look and let Jesus be the one who decides if he is clean or not. Giving Jesus this sort of authority is an exhilarating thing to do. It is also dangerous. Jesus just might tell us that not only is each one of us clean, everybody else is also clean and we have to live without our lepers.



PCUC VOTE – 23 OCTOBER

When we gather on Sunday 23 October, a special time will be allocated for the “vote” regarding the ‘Parramatta City Uniting Church’ or PCUC (i.e.. the provisional name for the coming together of our regional UCA congregations into ‘one’ – while still worshipping at various sites and retaining some individual programs and site-specific goals). The congregations involved in the PCUC vote are Leigh Memorial, Leigh Fijian, Westmead and Northmead and Parramatta Centenary.

The proposition to be voted upon is as follows:

It is proposed that the Leigh Fijian, Leigh Memorial, Northmead, Parramatta Centenary and Westmead congregations of the Uniting Church in Australia, having listened faithfully to one another, join together as one entity (to worship at various sites), on the basis that this is in the best interests of the mission of the Church, its worship, witness and service.

You will be asked to indicate whether you agree or disagree with this proposal. Please note that the vote will be a secret ballot and will be open to **members or members in association** who are **present and voting in person** only. Uniting Church meeting procedures do not permit any form of absentee or postal voting and Zoom will not be available for this purpose. It is important ahead of the vote that we have our membership rolls up to date, so a process to facilitate this is underway. Forms providing for affirmation of membership (or membership in association) will be available at church or may be emailed to you. HIMMI’S MEMORIAL

For those unable to join the livestream, Himmi’s recent funeral service included a powerpoint with some lovely photos of his time at Leigh. Eulogies were given by Himmi’s son Michael – a pastor with Wesley Mission – plus his nephew, grandson, and brother, Raymond. During his speech, Raymond shared Himmi’s mother’s favourite saying: “**Never forget God and God will never forget you**” – something that the family lived and worked by. A tribute was also paid to Himmi’s carer, Maz, who had accompanied him to our services in recent months. Many interesting facts about Himmi emerged during the eulogies, including that he and his family were transported from New Guinea to the safety of Sydney by the US airforce during WWII, and that he was a very gifted radio and TV technician in his younger years – as well as a lifelong tennis enthusiast. Thanks again Himmi – ‘Well Done, Good and Faithful Servant’ (Mathew 25: 21) – and ongoing prayers for the Tang family.





Church welcomes much-needed \$500m response to Ice Inquiry

In announcing its response to the Ice Inquiry, the NSW Government has ignored key expert evidence about how to end the ice epidemic, unable to get the much-needed reforms through its own cabinet.

Uniting NSW.ACT General Manager Advocacy and External Relations Emma Maiden welcomed the response but emphasised that further action is desperately needed.

"The announcement of \$358million for increased treatment, particularly in rural and regional areas, is a welcome relief," Ms Maiden said.

"This is a key element of the Fair Treatment campaign Uniting leads and we welcome the Government's delayed acceptance of the need for a dramatic increase in treatment funding.

"It is tragic that hundreds of thousands of people have been turned away from health services for alcohol and drug problems since the Ice Inquiry report was handed down. This has been exacerbated by the impacts of the COVID pandemic.

"With the Government's response taking 30 months, it is imperative the Government moves quickly to implement this announcement. Time is of the essence."

Ms Maiden said the NSW Government announcement on increased diversion is also welcomed.

"The Ice Inquiry's recommendations could not have been clearer. The current policing-based approach to drug use is not working. We need diversion, at the very least, to save lives and connect people to treatment when they seek it," Ms Maiden said.

"The announcement on diversion is only in principle, has \$400 fines and only offers two chances to change behaviour. That risks excluding the people with more serious drug dependency and who will benefit most from a non-policing approach to their behaviour."

"A large part of the reason why people with drug dependency don't reach out for help sooner is because of the criminal consequences of drug use. It's also the reason people don't tend to disclose their drug use to family, friends, or health professionals. This is why a better diversion approach is needed."

The Ice Inquiry cost over \$10 million and the final report had over 1300 pages and 109 recommendations. The public told their stories to the Inquiry all over NSW, including in Lismore, Nowra, Dubbo, East Maitland, Broken Hill and Moree.

The police submission to the inquiry supported diversion.

The community similarly supports non-criminal responses to personal drug use. The National Drug Strategy Household Survey shows 78 per cent of Australians support this.

"Close to our heart is that people be treated with dignity and respect, including people who use drugs," the Moderator of the Uniting Church (NSW and ACT), the Rev. Simon Hansford, said.

"Our drug laws are based on stigmatising and outdated ideas, not modern medical facts, and evidence. People who experience drug dependency are shamed and dehumanised when they should be offered life-saving connection.

"We need to have a more honest, open and ongoing conversation about alcohol and other drugs. Our current laws create harm by driving people away from seeking and finding the support they need."

Uniting NSW.ACT is the social justice and welfare arm of the Uniting Church and has spearheaded the Fair Treatment campaign for fairer drug laws and has been arguing for increased treatment services, particularly in rural and regional areas, for over four years.

It's been over 30 months since the Government's own Ice Inquiry handed down its Report. The following recommendations from the Special Inquiry into Ice have been rejected by the NSW Government, with little evidence to back up the decision.

- Decriminalisation
- Allow more medically supervised drug consumption rooms
- Pill testing
- Stopping drug detection dogs at music festivals
- Prison drug health programs and needle exchange
