

A HEALING COMMUNITY

Northmead-Centenary Uniting Church Fourth Sunday in Lent – 19th March 2023

Do you believe everything happens for a reason?

Some 300 years ago Sir Isaac Newton brought our attention to this matter as he watched an apple falling from a tree. This prompted Newton to ask a simple question – why did the apple fall – and more specifically, why did the apple fall down and not sideways or up?

Newton looked for a cause – and the answer? The apple fell down because of gravity. Gravity is the reason why.

Now this "cause" and "effect" thing seems pretty obvious. We know that, for example, if we deny plants light and water – they will die. We know that if lockdowns occur like those during COVID times - people are denied the opportunity to participate in important social events. And today we are acutely aware that if inflation goes up - then interest rates will follow.

But what about the many broader yet most profound experiences of life? Why is it that some of us experience terminal illness? Why is it that we lose loved ones far too soon? Why is it that disability impacts on the lives of so many?

Is there really a reason for all this – and what is it?

In a search for reasons, can we say a person, who dies of cancer, is being punished for doing something wrong? Does a young person, growing up with autism, do so because they have inherited the sins of their forefathers?

Could we ever suggest a person with congenital heart disease is born this way because its somehow character building or that the loss of a child happens in order to create resilience and make us better people?

Is it a matter that persons with various forms of physical disability – paraplegia, quadriplegia, muscular dystrophy, motor neurone disease, cerebral palsy, happens because their purpose is to become objects of our compassion and therefore be destined to be seen as people who are particularly "special" to God?

Friends, these gnawing questions do confront us at some stage in our lives as we ask the question "why" - and as we search for reasons. And the most unhelpful, insensitive and often cruel responses that are so often made here demonstrate the fact that there are really no easy answers.

With these things in mind, you may have heard other comments like these:

"Don't worry about your pain and suffering now. In heaven you will be made whole."

With these things in mind, you may have heard other comments like these:

"Don't worry about your pain and suffering now. In heaven you will be made whole."

Or:

"If you just have enough faith, God will cure you."

I shudder at these responses. In the light of my own personal experience of life and in the light on many years of pastoral ministry, such responses are not just misguided, they are I believe, troublesome and quite disturbing.

God does work miracles. But we need to approach these life matters openly and carefully. Importantly, we should let go our own agendas. We need to rise above the urge to find easy answers. Here it's critical that we dismiss the impulse to seek simplistic, superficial and often toxic explanations.

And with this in mind, let's consider the text for this week from John 9. Jesus and his disciples encounter a man who is blind from birth and Jesus' disciples immediately look for an explanation. It's that question we all ask at some stage in our lives – why do our loved ones suffer? Why are these people disabled? Why has this man been born blind?

Is it because of their own sin, or it is because of the sin of their parents?

In other words, are the infirmities and the disabilities we encounter in life the result of someone doing something wrong? In this story from John's Gospel, is this man's inability to see a punishment for offending God in some way?

But Jesus is quick to rebuke such assertions. Here we should carefully note Jesus' words:

"Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he has been born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him" (John 9:3).

Friends, Jesus firmly buries the assertion that suffering, illness and disability result from sin, that these things are effectively a punishment from God. Rather, there is something more profound going on here.

In the Biblical accounts of Jesus healing people there are, in fact, two terms used here – one is "to cure" and the other is "to heal".

To "cure" is to remove something that is causing or is responsible for an issue. It is to fix things by removing that cause. It is to approach something or someone as a problem to be solved. This, very much, embraces the medical model. We go to the doctor when sick. We do so to get "fixed", to combat an offending virus, to contain rising blood pressure or curb those cholesterol levels.

Meanwhile, to "heal" embraces a broader, deeper meaning. To "heal" is to restore, to integrate and to make whole. Healing touches the profound, intricate depths of our being. It deals with things, not as a problem to be solved, but as a means to what can be.

Healing doesn't necessarily provide what we call "solutions". It doesn't seek to combat, remove or "fix" things. Rather, healing delves into deeper things of life offering far-reaching, life-sustaining meanings.

I particularly see this in the way Jesus takes dirt from the ground, spits on it and spreads the mud on the man's eyes.

You may find this a bit a weird. But this strange gesture actually mirrors God's creative act as recorded in Genesis 2:7. Here in the story of creation, God forms humankind "from the dust of the ground".

For you see, the healing of this blind man is a creative act. It's an experience of transformation that involves much more than removing an impediment or fixing one's eyes.

What happens in this story is more than a simple cure. For this man blind from birth, is, as consequence with an encounter with Jesus, now no longer a person on the sidelines. He is no longer invisible to others. He is now free from a life of begging.

This man, born blind and now healed, is restored to community. He becomes articulate and self-aware. He is noticed, listened to and taken seriously. Moreover, he now lives with an astute awareness of God's presence in his life.

Friends, this is the true healing touch of Jesus!

Secondly, the text of John's Gospel takes the focus away from the blind man being a problem to be solved. Instead, it puts the focus clearly on God.

The purpose of this story doesn't concern magical cures for persons in deep need. Rather, it offers the opportunity for all to witness God as the One who brings about true "wholeness" and "wellbeing" in lives of God's people.

Friends, suffering, illness and disability cannot be explained in rational, "cause and effect" terms. Moreover, God doesn't choose to intentionally impose certain things on some people while allowing others to prosper. It's much more complex than that.

You see, a life in Christ is really all about being made "whole". It's a matter of experiencing a true "wholeness", an authentic peace and a deep assurance of God's presence in our lives – whoever we are - and in whatever circumstances we find ourselves in.

It's about knowing God is always there for us. That God is never against us. It's about affirming life is not a meaningless, "cause and effect" thing. That life is not a pointless, futile exercise full of black holes in which we are cast into an inevitable spiral of death.

Moreover, being made "whole", is about finding our place in the community around us, despite our circumstances. It's about being accepted, listened to, valued and being able to make a contribution, no matter how limited we believe we may be.

Now, this raises real challenges for us all because the healing touch of Jesus, I believe, causes us to think about a number of things:

- Ultimate "wholeness" is not about who is "abled" and who isn't.
- True "vision" is much more than being cured of blindness or being able to walk.
- Authentic, bona fide community has nothing to do with being "normal".
- A dynamic, healthy church is never uniform, neat and tidy.

And this means we are called to be:

- A church for all people able or disabled.
- A church where each and every person is to be encouraged to embrace a vision for the future, a vision that is to be recognised, valued and respected by all.
- A church where what is "normal" is surpassed by a commitment to difference. Where needs are not seen as a burden but are understood to be part of life and are taken seriously.
- A church where we live with the messy aspects of life. Where things can become a bit wobbly, uncomfortable and even disruptive at times.

Friends, the text of John's Gospel goes on to highlight the religious leaders of Jesus day. These were well educated, highly esteemed men. They could see. But, when you read the story, they were ultimately blind. They were blind to the deeper, more important things of life. It is as if they were cured but never healed!

Today, the challenge for us is to not seek quick and easy cures – but to embrace what it means to be a people who are not necessarily cured – but are truly healed.

And that means our calling is to be a truly "healing" community.

May this be an important part of our Lenten journey today as we walk the way Jesus.

Northmead Uniting Church has funding under the Targeted Earlier Intervention Program to employ an Adolescent and Family Counsellor to provide Counselling, Parenting Programs and Education and Skills Training to young people, parents, and families where the young person is experiencing mental health issues and/or is at risk of disengagement from school.

Our current Counsellor is planning to take some extended leave in the second half of this year.

We are looking to recruit a replacement Counsellor to fill this role on a part time basis (19 hours/week) for a period of approximately 25 weeks from 3 July 2023 to 22 December 2023.
