BEYOND OUR TRIBAL GODS

Acts 7:55-60; 1 Peter 2:2-10

I can't think of anything more gruesome or brutal than stoning someone to death. It has been a form of capital punishment since time immemorial and is practised in a number of countries around the world even to this day. It happens in fiercely proud communities when people feel they are deeply dishonoured or shamed.

This morning we hear the story of the stoning of Stephen, an early convert to Jesus Christ, who enrages the religious authorities of his day by questioning established traditions.

What we read about Stephen's tragic martyrdom today appears to be a somewhat sanitized version of events. But it doesn't take away the intensity and zeal of what is going on here. Stephen is ruthlessly murdered because he dares to question the ruling establishment of his day.

Now Stephen was an odd sort of person. He was not part of the majority 'in-group' of Jewish converts who spoke the local language of Aramaic and were committed to following Jesus as part of their existing Jewish faith. This included a strict adherence to the Law and a continuing acknowledgement and respect for the Temple.

Stephen was a 'Hellenist' or a foreign-born, Greek-speaking Jew. In this sense Stephen was a bit of an outsider. His experience of the wider world offered him a broader, one might say, more forward-looking vision that went beyond the conservative views of the locals.

Stephen's witness as a follower of Jesus was, therefore, different to those Jerusalembased converts whose experiences were very much framed within the existing traditions of the day.

With a 'bigger picture' view of things, Stephen challenged the present authorities and he particularly called into the question the role of the Temple which was, according to the religious practises of the day, absolutely sacrosanct as the very dwelling place of God on earth.

Friends, in many ways Stephen represented the first major controversy or, indeed, the first serious dispute that took place among the followers of Jesus. And it was a dispute between a foreign-born, Greek-speaking person of the world - and the local mob whose priority was preserving their identity, maintaining tradition and clearly not rocking the boat.

So, you see, what was going on in the lives of those early followers of Jesus wasn't all that different to the many struggles we face today as a Christian community.

We are no doubt aware of those debates that go on between 'progressives' and 'conservatives', 'liberals' and 'evangelicals'. We may be familiar with some of the 'culture wars' that are taking place when it comes to how we worship. And we probably have come across those disputes that pit the concept of personal sin and the need for individual salvation against an awareness of corporate sin and the need to change the world.

While we are called to be a "People of God", to be the "Body of Christ" in the world, the truth of the matter is that we remain fraught, vulnerable human beings. The church has been, like so any institutions, embroiled in controversies and disputes for centuries. We haven't exactly gone on with stoning people to death. But burning people at the stake was hardly an improvement!

Conservative backlashes in recent times have seen some church leaders request those who support same-sex marriage to "leave the church" while others openly support and promote the ongoing sub-ordination of women.

Meanwhile George Orwell, that great English writer, sends a signal to ardent progressives by warning them against the dangers of an over-reaching, zealous reform. In his political fable called <u>Animal Farm</u>, Orwell reminds us that amiable, very well-intentioned acts that challenge entrenched ways of doing things can, ironically, lead to new forms of oppression if we are not careful.

This leads me to me the conclusion that, in the wake of conflict and dispute, human beings, whether they be Christian or otherwise, whether they be 'progressives' or 'conservatives', 'liberals' or "evangelicals', have a real disposition to tribalize.

By 'tribalize" I mean we tend to gravitate towards those people and places which share our particular values and beliefs. In other words, its quite natural to form 'progressive' or 'conservative' camps. It's pretty normal to identify with a group of like-minded people. It's rather commonplace to form an 'us' and 'them' mentality which serves to justify what is important to us and to then distance or even demonise those whose views are different.

This happens with the rise of fundamentalism. And we see it in so many places around the world today.

Fundamentalism often comes out of a real sense of insecurity and a fear of the world. It arises when people yearn for defined, absolute answers to what are puzzling, complex issues.

Sadly, this is how the Bible is sometimes read – as a textbook that has all answers neatly defined and ready to go without any effort to carefully discern, interpret or apply.

But it's not only conservatives who tribalize. Researchers tell us this is a universal human trait. Those on the progressive spectrum are also vulnerable.

We are all vulnerable.

One of my favourite authors is the contemporary American writer, Marilynne Robinson. Marilynne writes out of a profound Christian faith. She is highly respected in literary circles and has won a number of awards including the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction.

In her essay "Wondrous Love" Marilynne Robinson refers to what she calls a form of "tribalism" that reduces God to a "tribal deity".

We are all prone to doing this from time to time. It puts us into 'theological straightjackets'. Here dogmatic assertions or feisty manifestos can dominate and drive us

as we try to make God into what serves our purpose.

I find that, in my own life and in my ministry, I need to be constantly aware of this, lest I fall into what really becomes a kind of idolatry.

Whether we are on the 'right' or the 'left', the 'conservative' or the 'progressive' – we all need to take heed.

I say this because the kind of 'tribalism' Marilynne Robinson talks about can belittle the Christian life. Faith risks becoming an opinion piece, an ideological hangup or a convenient defence mechanism.

Such tribalism, I believe, turns the church inwards. We become pre-occupied with ourselves, with our particular 'positions' or pre-disposed stands on issues. Meanwhile seeds of disunity are sown as we define who we are by setting ourselves over and against others.

Such tribalism, I fear, fails to reflect the true character of Christ. Rather, it mirrors the world with its divisive social cliques and competing political camps that speak more about the "spirit of the age" than the "Spirit of God".

Marilynne Robinson writes in the context of the culture-wars that are raging in the United States at present. These can be pretty intense and nasty at present - and the Christian community - on the 'right' and the 'left', the 'conservative' and the 'progressive' - seem to be in the thick of it.

With these things in mind, Marilynne Robinson reminds us of the heritage, the truth and the reality to which we all belong. And this is a heritage, a truth and a reality that embraces "the wondrous love of God".

This is a heritage, a truth and a reality that speaks of an unconditional love, a generosity of spirit and a calling to live lives that are wholesome, just and peaceful.

This is a heritage, a truth and a reality that is always open to others, where one experiences a deep sense of well-being and a willingness to trust God rather than succumb to the whims of personal anxieties or the impulse to feed long-standing aspirations.

This is a heritage, a truth and reality that, in Marilynne Robinson's words: "are too great a narrative to be reduced to serving any parochial interest."

And may I add to this by returning to our text today.

As Stephen faces the wrath of those he has offended, we read that he was "filled with the Holy Spirit", that he "gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God" (Acts 7:55).

This is rather colourful religious language that speaks about Stephen opening his life to an experience greater than himself.

This is a sacred story which says Stephen courageously lets his guard down as he dismisses personal prejudices, as he sidesteps devout agendas and as he goes beyond whatever may serve his purpose to allow the awesome, wondrous, majestic presence of God fill and direct his life.

Friends, I believe it's true that Stephen remained a radical. It's true Stephen was most likely a true 'progressive' of his time. But he saw beyond this. Stephen embraced a bigger vision – a vision that Marilynne Robinson so beautifully articulates in those words: "the wondrous love of God".

So, you see, Stephen wasn't simply having a crack at the conservatives. Nor was he just waving the flag for his particular faction.

Friends, I believe Stephen stepped out, indeed Stephen got himself killed, because of an honest, open, passionate encounter with the God who calls us all into a community of faith that is gracious, loving and open to the other.

No matter whether our tendencies are to the 'right' or to 'left', to 'conservative' or 'progressive', we are called to move beyond our tribal gods. We are urged to lay aside those self-serving deities to be, as the Apostle Peter so eloquently proclaims:

"a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvellous light." (1 Peter 2:9).

This means no more 'stoning to death', no more 'burning at the stake', no more scorn or ridicule, no more self-justification or demonising of those with whom we don't agree.

Friends, our calling to follow Jesus is far more important than this.

For we are the church – the "People of God", the "Body of Christ" – and this outstrips any need, on our behalf, to defend our personal views. This exceeds any urge to label, caricature or stereotype others. This surpasses any yearning to make God into our likeness or pursue a God who serves our own particular purposes.

In a world crying out for healing and for hope lets, no matter where we stand on the theological scale or where choose to be on the spectrum of ideas, passions, commitments or political persuasions, open ourselves to the leading of the Spirit.

Let us reflect the true glory of God - in who we are - and in everything we do! Amen.



HASSALL FAMILY REUNION

This weekend, the Hassall family will be having a large reunion in Parramatta, marking 225 years since Rowland and Elizabeth Hassall arrived and established a home on George Street. One of their daughters, Mary Hassall, who was born in Parramatta, went on to marry Rev Walter Lawry – the second of Parramatta Mission's earliest ministers. Rev Lawry arrived in Parramatta from Cornwall in 1818 and it was he and Mary who commenced the first Wesleyan Methodist Chapel and Sunday School at our Macquarie Street site in 1821 – largely using Mary's marriage dowry to fund the project. An offer has been made to the Hassall family to visit Leigh Memorial while they're in the city - and to have a tour of the Walter Lawry Memorial Park at North Parramatta.

The Heritage Committee conducted a PCUC tour of Lawry Park last year, and a tour of St. John's Cemetery for members of the PCUC (inc. historic gravesites relevant to the Leighs, Lawrys, Hassalls and Marsdens) is currently in the planning. CORONATION MUSIC: 'ZADOK THE PRIEST'



This Saturday 6 May, Britain and the Commonwealth will witness the coronation of King Charles III and Queen Camilla at Westminster Abbey. The coronation is an Anglican service steeped in sacred traditions and includes various, time-honoured Christian prayers and including a rendition of the famous 'Zadok coronation anthem, Priest' (composed by George Frideric Handel and first played at the coronation of King George II in 1727). Handel based his composition

(one of a set of coronation anthems) on Zadok's holy anointing of King Solomon in the first chapter of <u>1 Kings</u> in the Old Testament. The lyrics of the anthem include the words: "Zadok the priest and Nathan the prophet anointed Solomon king. And all the people rejoiced and said, "God Save the King! Long Live the King! May the King live forever! Amen! Alleluia!" <u>Painting</u>: 'The Anointing of Solomon' by Cornelis de Vos (1629) (Public Domain).

PHOTO ARCHIVE: CORONATION OF 1902

One of the oldest photos in the Parramatta Mission Archival Collection is from 1902 (pictured). It depicts Leigh Memorial decorated for the **coronation of King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra**, which took place following the death of Edward's mother, Queen Victoria. In the photo, the church's sanctuary is seen draped in flags, including two, very large Australian naval flags hanging from either side of the high pulpit. Also placed at the top of the pulpit are framed photos of the King and Queen and two large replica crowns. Such tributes were typical of an era in when the Methodist Church in Australia expressed a strong allegiance to the British Empire. Another point of interest is that the photo shows Leigh Memorial prior to the large-scale renovations of 1905 — which resulted in a lowering of the gallery, pulpit and roof, and a re-configuring of the choir stalls in front of the organ.
