



WEEKLY REFLECTION Easter7A 2023 John 17. 1-11

Jesus prays the way of eternal life Vladimir Korotkov

1. Introduction

In this passage John leads us into Maundy Thursday, when Jesus and the disciples are gathered in the Upper Room. Jesus informs them of his pending fate, his certain death. The weight of sadness, grief and disbelief would permeate the room with heaviness.



I have been in situations of pending death. Standing to the side, while a family gathers in the bedroom, or the hospice room, to allow their loved one to speak their last words. You sense the desire to hold back time. We stand back in awe and respect, not wanting to let them go, yet knowing we are powerless. Inevitably, the last breath is gasped. We are silent. And prayer full. We are not alone!

In this time of crisis Jesus is in the midst of his community, in this humble context, not of temple or palace. Here, Jesus creates an alternative space, and counter-reality to those condemning him, High Priest, Jewish King and Roman Pilate. And Jesus prays.

This prayer has elements of the prayer Jesus taught in the Gospels. But, as the New Testament scholar Bill Loader writes,

It is not that there was such a prayer which Jesus spoke in this distinctively Johannine way of which the rest of the tradition, reflected in the other gospels, had no knowledge. Rather in John's story of Jesus' life and importance he has creatively imagined what Jesus might have said and what would have been the issues for him in this final prayer.

And, still stuck in the language of Christendom and its structures, some describe this as a High Priestly prayer. I would use different discourse. Here, Jesus remains removed from a sanctuary of religiosity. Within the echo of that grimy world of dirty politics in the Temple and Palace nearby, Jesus prays. Amongst his grieving community, whose feet he has just washed and with whom he shares the intimacy of a meal and intimate friendship, he prays!

2. Vulnerability: hoping in doubt, trusting in danger

And Debie Thomas shapes words that movingly convey the spirit of this context and prayer:

Jesus spends his final hours on earth in humble, vulnerable supplication to God. He ends his ministry by asking into uncertainty. Hoping into doubt. Trusting into danger. Asking is the last act of love he pours out to the disciples gathered around his table. It is the last tender memory he gives them. The last gesture of hope he extends. Contrary to what we might expect (or prefer), he doesn't awe his followers with a grand finale of miracles, or humble them with a show of divine authority and power. He looks up to heaven with a trembling heart, and surrenders his cherished friends to God.

3. The new realm of eternal life

Yet, within this genuine prayer we find images that suggest Jesus is presenting a new world order. We find an alternative understanding and practice of divine authority and power. And I suggest that this reshapes our values, and restructures human power and authority and our structures. Not reforms but transvalues and transforms; reborn!

The first indicator of this new world order is glimpsed in Jesus' use of the term "eternal life" zoe aionios, which he uses twice in his prayer. Brian McLaren, in *The Secret Message of Jesus*, informs us that the term "eternal life" is the term John uses for "the kingdom of God", or realm of God, which was central to the message of Jesus in the other Gospels. McLaren writes that "later in John's Gospel, Jesus reduces the phrase simply to "life," or "life to the full." McLaren then concludes that this means having an interactive relationship with God and with Jesus Christ, which he says is what a kingdom is, a realm where people have an interactive relationship with the king and the other subjects.

But for me, while this is insightful, this term "interactive relationship" is too vague and loose and can allow hierarchical structures and its unequal values and subject positions. It needs to be expanded to include transformed values and structures, totally unlike those with kings and kingdoms.

And John's Jesus constantly addressed this in teaching and practice. Such as his encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well, where many conventional values and structures are turned upside down. Such as his teaching, "you are my friends, no longer do I call you slaves" (John 15:12ff), which means new identities and freedoms, and new subject positions in social and cultural contexts that have transformed horizontal structures.

Kelly Oliver writes in The colonisation of psychic space: a psychoanalytic social theory of oppression that

Our sense of self is profoundly affected by our social position. This shapes and forms us. Subjects are formed within particular kinds of social contexts.

And subjects can be deformed by the social positions created for them.

4. Transvalued and redefined Glory

The second indicator of this new world order in the prayer of Jesus is glimpsed in his use of the term "glory". This is an important term and theme in ancient and even modern Mediterranean societies. According to NT scholars Malina and Rohrbaugh. Social-Science Commentary on the Gospel of John. the term "glory" is part of the honour/shame society of that time.

Simply stated, honor is public reputation. It is symbolized in good name or eminent family of origin. It is one's status or standing in the village together with the public recognition of it. Public recognition is all-important... Thus, when Jesus says in 5:41 (also 12:43) that he does not accept glory from human beings, he is rejecting a core value of Mediterranean societies. When he claims in 5:44 that one should seek only the honor that comes from God, he is saying that only God has the wisdom to legitimate an honor gain. This, of course, makes perfect sense for members of John's anti-society ...

So, what is implied here is that a system of honour is created in a culture, a village, a city, a community. And mostly it is created by those in power, who own economic resources and wield political power. Jesus' life, teaching and practice reveal that he is not interested in such glory and honour. And what is powerful is that Jesus asks God to glorify him precisely when the world will shame and humiliate him, because he is antisociety! Glory is transvalued and redefined.

Conclusion


This is a radical and powerful prayer, which has many radical implications. The desire and work of the divine life, the life that is eternal, this life is abundant, overflowing, and this life seeks to overflow into our inner lives, into the way we live together, into our values and structures.

This prayer concludes with a powerful and impossible yearning, but one we are to keep seeking to express:

"they are still in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Parent God, protect them by the power of your name, the name you gave me, so that they may be one as we are one."

The Uniting Climate Action Network is gathering to plan next steps, and you're invited!

The Uniting Climate Action Network (UCAN) was established in 2021. It's a way of connecting people in the Uniting Church and wider community who believe care for the earth and all its life matters. For many in the church this care is an important dimension of their faith, discipleship, and mission. For others, it's a core personal conviction and value. For all, it's a motivation to act – on climate change, protecting forests, reducing waste and pollution, for the health of our rivers, and many other concerns.

UCAN's vision is to foster, support and grow this type of action. Of course, we encourage members to join in advocacy on climate change as part of the Synod Climate Action Strategy (this Strategy was established by a resolution at the 2019 Synod meeting). But we also aim to support the different issues and grassroots initiatives that our members and congregations are engaged in.

To focus our efforts, UCAN is having an <u>online next steps gathering on the</u> <u>evening of Monday May 22, from 7.00pm-8.30pm</u>.

You and all interested people are invited to be part of it.

Why now?

It is nearly one year since the Federal election. There have been some positive developments in climate policy and practical action since then. But the latest report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) reminds us we need to ramp up the scale and urgency of action if we are to secure a safe climate future for all.

At the UCAN gathering we will:

- Reflect on what has happened in climate since the election and where we are at now
- Remind ourselves of how climate action fits with the faith and values of the Uniting Church and our own values
- Identify the key actions needed to reduce emissions nationally and what part we can play in those, as well as other concerns of members Hear what resources and training we offer to support network members in both broader climate action and other grassroots environmental issues

You don't have to be an existing UCAN member to join in the forum. All those with an interest in environmental care and action on climate change are welcome.
