The Girl in the Red Dress

Who is the girl in the red dress? Let me explain.

As a young man, the highly regarded Australian author Richard Flanagan, was one day sifting through some colonial paintings in the Hobart Museum when he came upon this watercolour. It's a picture of a small Aboriginal girl in a red silk dress bound with a black velvet band. Flanagan was quite taken by this painting and, after making an enquiry, discovered the girl's name is Mathinna.

Mathinna was one of the few First Nations people who survived the horrors of the Black War in Van Dieman's Land when a violent, murderous onslaught by colonial authorities took place against First Nations people who resisted British occupation.

Things came to a head when over 2,000 settlers, including the military, took part in a massive offensive called the "Black Line". This effectively herded First Nations people, who had lived on their ancestral lands for millennia, at gunpoint into the south-east corner of Tasmania leaving them at the mercy of their captors.

Mathinna's parents were the Lowreenne people from Tasmania's south-west. In 1833 Colonial government policy dictated that all remaining First Nations people be deported to Flinders Island in nearby Bass Strait. Here Mathinna was born two years later.

Not long after her birth Mathinna was taken from her parents by the colonial authorities with the intention of educating her out of aboriginal ways. Mathinna was a bright, intelligent girl and in 1841, at the age of six years, Mathinna was adopted by the governor, Sir John Franklin and his wife, Lady Jane.

The Franklins, like most of colonials, believed in a "great chain of being" where human races were ranked according to a kind of evolutionary theory with Europeans at the top and everyone else in descending order according to their level of "civilisation". Indigenous or First Nations people were at the bottom. Indigenous people were, in fact, seen as scientific curios and it was this thinking that led the Franklins and other subjects of the crown to take the children "for their own good" and "Europeanise" them. At the age of five years Mathinna arrived at Government House with a kangaroo skin, a rush basket, some shell necklaces and a pet possum. Suddenly she was launched into Hobart's elite, upper class.

At first Sir John Franklin was quite infatuated with Mathinna. The experiment to "raise" her to the level of British society seemed to be working. It was, at this time, that Mathinna's portrait was painted – the girl in the red dress.

But things started to go wrong. Mathinna became what effectively was a "trophy doll" or an "exotic pet" who was put on display as an oddity by the governor and his wife.

A few years past and Sir John Franklin was recalled to London and, at the age of 8, the Franklins quickly abandoned Mathinna. After being given pride of place in the plush governor's residence, Mathinna was dumped in an orphanage and then returned to Flinders Island where she was despised by the white community and alienated from her own people.

As a teenager Mathinna was relocated back to Hobart into a fringe community where, in her abandonment, Mathinna was cruelly consumed by a life of alcohol and prostitution. The Franklins never followed up or contacted Mathinna.

The "experiment" was over and, at the age of 18, Mathinna tragically drowned in a remote creek while intoxicated. Her body was buried together with many of her people, and her remains are believed to been exhumed sometime later to be used by the University of Melbourne for "scientific purposes".

Mathinna's story deeply troubles me. It has been told in a number of places, most significantly by the Bangarra Dance Theatre and now by Richard Flanagan in his confronting novel "Wanting".

I share this story this morning out of a deep sense of grief for people whose lives are impacted, damaged and so often destroyed by the indiscretions, the transgressions or what Professor Marcia Langton refers to as a "base racism" or "sheer stupidity" that underlies some approaches to First Nations people.

Mathinna had little chance. She was condemned by a system which never truly valued her for the person she was.

Friends, this girl in the red dress was foremost in my mind when I read the Gospel text for today from Matthew 20.

In this parable it's early morning. A landowner hires people to work in his vineyard for the standard daily wage. Additional people are hired at 9am, at noon, at 3pm and again at 5pm. Each group is told they will be given "whatever is right". When the day ends those who laboured for the shortest time receive the standard daily rate. Meanwhile the same amount is pledged to those who had worked since the early morning.

The full day workers are resentful. They claim this is unfair - why shouldn't they be paid more than those who only worked are few hours?

Now, we can read this parable in a number of ways. We can approach this story through the lens of economic justice. What's important here is that the story is not about rewards, rather it's about meeting basic needs.

Justice is defined in terms of what is needed rather than what is deserved.

Secondly, we can take a more religious approach. Here the parable speaks about the nature of God's salvation. For you see, salvation is for all – for those who commit their lives at a young age and serve Christ diligently all their years and those, who on their death beds, at the end of their lives, affirm the faith and open their hearts to gracious love of God.

Thirdly, this parable can be read in terms of generosity. Generosity, for many, comes with conditions. Generosity is tied to meeting all sorts of criteria. But in this this parable Jesus makes it abundantly clear that the generosity of God has no strings attached. God's generosity, which we can understand in terms of grace, is unconditional and free. In God's way of doing things no one is more deserving than the other.

But allow me to offer another reading of the text. I believe this story is about value and worth. Here the focus is not just on economic justice, salvation for all or an abundant generosity that exceeds all expectations.

A hint here comes when, at the end of the day, those who worked from the early morning make a response. They actually don't complain because they feel they have received a raw deal or have been cheated. Rather, if you look closely at the text, you will see they complain because "these last worked one hour, and you have made them <u>equal</u> to us" (Matt 20:12).

The accusation here is that the landowner dealt <u>equally</u> with his workers – long -term workers and those who worked for an hour at the end of the day. In the minds of the long-term workers those had to wait all day for work must have, no doubt, been of lesser value and worth. This would have been so because no other employer considered hiring them.

The long-term workers, therefore, see themselves, as superior, as having special privileges, of being more worthy and of greater value to the landowner. But this wasn't surprising . These disgruntled long-term workers were simply mirroring a common understanding that declares society is a hierarchy of interests, a hierarchy of stations with the deserving rich at the top and the non-deserving poor at the bottom. We are all familiar with such things.

But Jesus has none of this. He unleashes a most radical declaration that even today has the power to rattle the most entrenched interests. Jesus advocates a massive reversal in the way the world is to be seen and in the way we are to live.

Here those who think themselves superior by declaring there are greater and lesser beings, those who believe they are entitled to run roughshod over others for the sake their own interests, those who chose to measure the value of people around them according to their own pretentious, narrow, self-focussed view of the world - are in for a big shock!

For Jesus presents us with a radically new way -a way where inherent Godgiven value and worth are the decisive factors in the way we relate to others, in the way we live in community and in the way we are the church. This means people are to be accepted, nurtured, guided and loved for who they are and for who they are created to be. But please note there is more to this new way as declared by Jesus. For, you see it's a way that not only values and gives worth to all. It's a way that calls on the privileged and the powerful to create spaces. It calls those on the higher runs of the hierarchy to stand aside, to let go, to relinquish their places so that the most vulnerable, the most marginalised, the most dispossessed can be recognised, accepted, enriched and empowered.

And this is, of course, summed up most in those confronting words of Jesus: "the last will first, and the first shall be last" (Matthew 20:16).

As I pondered these things, I asked myself – what does this all mean for the girl in the red dress? What does this all mean for Mathinna and for all the Mathinna's of this world?

Moreover, what does this mean for us as a church living in Western Sydney, one of the most diverse, dynamic, complex regions of Australia? What does this mean for us as followers of Jesus in such a vast metropolis of millions which includes some of the most privileged, and some of the most disadvantaged, marginalised people in this nation?

What does this mean for us as we move forward together and as we prayerfully elect our Parramatta City Uniting Church leadership? For, out there, old hierarchies still shadow us, entrenched prejudices remain and the endless quest for status and wealth, continues to be the principal driver for so many people.

Friends, the story of the girl in the red dress is a tragedy that is by no means unique in our history. It has been repeated over and over again – and its being repeated today.

Can we learn from this? Can we avoid such tragedies now and in the future? Can we, as a church, live out a new way, a way that says no to ethnocentrism, no to hierarchies that rank races and cultures, no to racial stereotypes, no to class distinctions, no gender discrimination and no to the devaluing and exploitation of those who are most vulnerable?

Can we as Christians, one and all, bear witness to a community where Mathinna and so many like her will be first?

Jesus sets the challenge before us today. May we be faithful to his calling.

Amen.

Can you come to our Pasifika rally on climate with Minister Chris Bowen- Pasifika Empowered 2023?

Uniting Church members are invited to support their Pasifika brothers and sisters in a climate rally with Federal Minister Chris Bowen on Saturday October 7th.

This is a follow-up from the first climate forum held in Penrith in April 2022 just before the Federal election.

As with last year, the Pasifika Empowered 2023 forum is being led by Uniting Church Pasifika leaders. The event will be on the afternoon of Saturday October 7th at the Pullman Hotel in Olympic Park from 1.00pm-4.00pm. The event coincides with Fiji Day celebrations on all day at Cathy Freeman Park, just a few hundred metres away. The theme of Pasifika Empowered is on climate change and its impacts on the cost of living now, and our hopes for a good future – in the Pacific but and also here. We think especially of those who are more vulnerable to the negative impacts of climate change, including communities in western and south-western Sydney.

The two-hour event will include welcomes from First Nations people and our new Moderator, Rev Mata Havea Hiliau, music and song and input on Pasifika theology and worldview. There will be personal stories of climate impacts, input from Chris Bowen and our questions to him.

While the event is led by the Uniting Church Pasifika community, we very much want the wider Uniting Church and community to be part of it. It is an opportunity to be in solidarity with our Pasifika neighbours, as well as voice our own concerns.
